Every child's education matters



We live in a world where technology, driven by data and artificial intelligence is the impetus for economic growth and prosperity. However, underneath all the bright headlines and numbers are the ugly truths and forgotten realities of the increasing income gap between the rich and poor, leaving many millions marginalised and in poverty, children are the ones who are suffering the most.

At NFI School, even as we move into our fourth year of existence, we continue to focus on our vision to nurture and empower underprivileged children to be world changers through transformative education.

As I reflect on 2021, it is no different from every other year since the inception of NFI School. It was filled with challenges and triumphs, heartbreaks, and laughter. Through it all, we can look back with gratitude to God for His steadfast love, unceasing providence, and abundant provision. He has helped us at NFI School to accomplish what seems to be the impossible.

Please allow me to give a summary of highlights for the year, 2021:

- Our enrolment increased by approximately 56% to a record 71 pupils from 40. This increase stretched NFI School resources, and I must commend the NFI School staff for their sacrifices.
- 13 out of our 22 young adults participated in the prestigious African Leadership Academy five-day camp programme.
- Five of our pupils participated in shortlisting exercise for the United Nations Food Systems dialogues with school age children and adolescents. One pupil, Aisha Musa, was nominated among nine other children from elite schools in Abuja, to meet with Vice President Yemi Osinbajo during the programme.
- We enrolled two of our extension school students in private school in Asokoro with annual school fees of approximately N800,000.
- We enrolled nine of our extension school students in Government Secondary School (JSS1-SS1) under the extension school scholarship programme.
- At the beginning of the year, we hosted one of our board members, Pastor Theo Martins and his wife, Pastor (Mrs) Kate Martins.
- Our staff strength moved from three to ten for both teaching and non-teaching faculties.

- We launched our children playground with a brand new covered six-seater swing equipment and a 30sqm artificial carpet grass.
- We built two classrooms, one administrative office, a music room and toilet.
- We launched our computer room with two used desktop computers and three laptops.
- Bambii Media shot a documentary for the school.
- Run Club, Abuja in partnership with Giving.Ng donated one fully furnished, large sized classroom and four brand new desktop.
- We launched our vocational studies summer programme with focus on teaching our pupils baking, beading, soap making, hair plaiting, weaving, sewing, coding, and creative arts.
- We launched our school website. www.nfischool.org
- We launched our music school. We had two keyboards donated to us and we acquired a complete set of drums, three guitars and one saxophone.
- We had several celebrations and competitions ranging from children's day, teacher's appreciation day, cultural day, Christmas party, monthly birthday, spelling bee, mathematics competition.
- We bought new clothes for children for both Sallah and Christmas under a donor-supported initiative.

2021 was indeed a busy and challenging year filled with many milestones, and we could not have done it without all of you — NFI School faithful friends and partners.

On behalf of the board of Trustees of NFI School, I want to say a big thank you for all your kindness and support as we seek to transform the lives of our children.

Looking ahead, NFI School will continue to innovate our teaching model, utilise technology and build partnerships to increase our impact in the communities that we work with, and focus on the long-term sustainability of the school.

As I invite you to continue journeying with us, may God bless you and your family. And may He continue to guide and light our path at NFI School.

- **2021 highlights**

- **Summer School**

Our first summer school was organized for three weeks in August (2nd-20th) with the support of Delightful Concepts, Mrs. Tinuke Kuti, Pastor Mrs. Oluwadahunsi and her two children. Holidaying Jire Smith, Emeka Elumelu, Oseghale Daniel, Lember Charles Allah, Bolaji Wale-Banmore, Oluwakorede Adeniyi were also on ground to help along with several parents. We had about 100 children and young adults in attendance. NFI pupils and non-NFI School pupils learnt so much skills.

Children learnt how to bake different pastries; make different designs of bead necklaces; weave different grades of fabric mats; plait different styles of hairdo; make soap and petroleum jelly; speak French and Spanish; play different musical instrument, sew different styles of clothes, coding etc. Some parents came to support the different vocational studies. The summer school ended with an exhibition and presentation of gifts.





- **African Leadership Academy- Empower Africa**

The **Empower Africa** camps are a short, residential 3 to 5-day in-person programme for students between age 14 to 18. These camps aim to equip aspiring movers and shakers with the tools and skills on how to become courageous and ethically minded leaders. Our 13 extension school students were privileged to attend this camp in August for five days. The students learned to live independently as they attended workshops, participated in many group and team building activities. Afterwards, Mr. IK of Empower Africa donated several stationeries to our school.





• Launch of Music NFI

NFI believes that inside every child is a song. The music studio was launched in June 2021, thanks to Mrs. Obiageli Obianozie, Mrs. Ibilola Essien and Mr. Tosin Ashafa for their generous donations of two keyboards and bringing music and musical instrument education to the children of NFI School. In addition, NFI School acquired a set of drums and amplifier. Mr. Oluwakorede Adeniyi donated three guitars and one saxophone. Now, we have a seasoned music teacher, and the music classes run twice a week for all pupils.



- **Aisha's Feat**

All of us at NFI School were happy to celebrate Aisha, our head girl, who was nominated along nine other school age children to meet Vice President Yemi Osibajo at a dialogue session on food systems.

- **Cultural Day**

At the beginning of third term, our pupils were challenged to research, develop, and present their cultural craft and food to the school in an exhibition.

During the exhibition, pupils and parents took turns to educate the crowd on their cultural food, attire, and songs. This is where they taught others how to make the crafts and food thereby exposing others to the rich heritage of their culture, and our diversity as a country.

We invited a very special guest, Mrs. Onoyiveta to chair the event and she honoured our invitation.





- **Enrolment in Private School**

Two of our extension school students who were in Government Secondary School, Shere, Abuja (boarding school) were enrolled in a private school in Asokoro. Thanks to a generous annual grant of almost N=800,000 (Eight hundred thousand naira) from **Mayowa Dickson Foundation**.

Montessori Education curriculum Material

We received more Montessori materials in the year. Our nursery pupils were introduced to some aspects of Montessori education- Practical life, Sensorial, and Cultural scheme. Thankfully, our co-founder, Mrs. Adeniyi concluded her diploma in Montessori education, so we hope to continue to integrate Montessori method and materials in our early year classes.



- **Teacher Training/Staff recruitment**

- Intensive Jolly Phonics Training – Universal Learning Solution

All our teachers attended the two-day intensive Jolly Phonics training on how to effectively use synthetic method in teaching children to read. This session was donated by the Universal Learning Solutions.

Further in-house trainings were organized in January, May, September. Some of our training sessions were facilitated by teachers under our peer learning programme. Miss Doyinsola Wale-Banmore of Bambii Media was equally invited to train our teachers on personal development programmes. Also, Mrs. Ugo Obasi was invited to charge the on importance of observation and discovery of individual child abilities.

In one of our nursery teacher's trainings, we invited Mrs. Funke Abegunde, a seasoned professional from American International School, Abuja to train our teachers on how to creatively use various teaching aids.

In the year, some of our teachers attended external training courses on class decoration, Confidence in teaching mathematics, effective language and literacy in class etc. organised by Chelis Education Consults.

We welcomed six new teachers, one cook, one cleaner, and one daytime security guard/janitor to our school in the year and sent forth two of our good old teachers. Our staff strength moved from three teachers to seven teachers and three non-teaching staff.



Blended Curriculum

At the beginning of 2021/22 session, the school implemented a broad-based blended curriculum in the nursery category which is an inclusive of Nigerian, British and Montessori curriculum. In our nursery session, the children are learning practical life, sensorial, language apart from their core subjects.



Infrastructural development

This year, we built two additional classrooms, one administrative office, one music room and one additional toilet. We converted the former administrative office to a computer hub. We acquired two HP desktops and one additional laptop. In June, we did the flooring of the common paths in the school and built a new playground with an additional equipment. Special thanks to the generous construction grant from Mummy S. Garuba, Mrs. Fatima Modupe and our co-founder, Mr. Olusegun Adeniyi. Likewise, we are grateful to the Run Club, Abuja in partnership with Giving.Ng for their generosity.



Social and other Events

This year, we continued our monthly children's and teacher's birthday celebration with cake cutting music and dancing. This celebration contributes to better social development in our children and allows for balance in their experience. Special thanks to Mrs. Sandra Adio, Miss Tobi Oluwadahunsi and Mr. Mayowa Dickson for all the food, drinks, and party packs they shared with the children on their birthday. Mr. Mayowa Dickson went further to donate new sets of school uniforms, sport wears, socks and two pair of shoes to each child in the school.



There were lots to eat, drink, and play on our children's day celebration. We had mascots and bouncy castle to amplify the celebration.

We also marked our first teacher's day celebration with cake and cash gift for all teachers.

The Samaritan Purse in conjunction with Jesus Children Bible Club donated 27 Christmas gift boxes to the Christian children in our school.

Mrs. Dupe Ogundimu funded 10 of our Christian pupils to a Christian Easter camp in RCCG, TEAP.

With great joy, we closed the year with a prize giving day and Christmas party. Special thanks to **Mayowa Dickson Foundation** for all the clothes, drinks, cake, biscuits and sweets, games, bouncy castle, trampoline etc. The day was filled with music from an invited DJ, dancing, drama, and various presentation by each class. The class presentation was graded by our special guests of the day and primary four won the best presentation award.



Sallah and Christmas New clothes project

For the first time this year, Director of the MacArthur Foundation's Africa Office, **Dr. Kole Shettima** donated the sum of N1,000,000 (One Million naira) to acquire brand new clothes for all the 10 staff and 88 children in the primary and extension school during Sallah and Christmas. Equally, **Mayowa Dickson Foundation** donated 200 packs of different six-yard fabrics to our staff and pupils during Sallah and Christmas celebration.





- **Other Donations in kind**

This year, Metro Bakery & Foods donated cake, snacks, four cartoons of indomie, eight packs of caprisun, one cartoon of power oil, three 25kg bags of rice, golden penny twist and 2,452 packs of delicious Thursday meals: Jollof rice, spaghetti and yam porridge etc



- **Mayowa Dickson Foundation** donated two large sized cakes, 80 egg rolls, one bag of rice, over 200 packs of six yards fabrics, 24 cartoons of indomie, 28 cartoons of spaghetti, 12 cartoons of biscuits, 22 packs of nutri milk drinks, 14 crates of soft drinks, 12 packs of sweets/chocolates, 157 yohurts and ice-cream. Also, the foundation provided large quantities of groceries for our two boarding house students. Similarly, a representative of the foundation went to visit our students in Government Secondary School, Shere, Abuja. The school is about 26 kilometres away from the city centre. More significantly, the foundation donated about N800,000 annual scholarship grant for senior secondary school education in an Asokoro private school for two of our extension school students. Ms. Koyinsola Olukoya, representative of the foundation, visits the school regularly to check on the welfare of the children. During Mr. Mayowa Dickson's 18th birthday, the foundation provided over 100 packs of food and drinks, two cakes and party packs. Also, the foundation gave a grant for new set of school uniform, sport wear, two pairs of sock and shoe to mark the birthday. The foundation provided bouncy castle, trampoline, Christmas cake, lots of drinks, chocolate, biscuits and sweets during our end of year party.





- **Mr. Sunday Danbachi** donated 10 packs of Bobo drinks

Mrs. Eki donated one cooler of delicious jollof rice and chicken, beef, scotch eggs and six crates of soft drinks

Universal Learning Solution donated two intensive Jolly Phonics training, 42 Jolly Phonics banners, tricky words banner, 74 story books, two packs of workbooks and teacher's books.

Mrs. Aisha Coker donated two cakes and several snacks.

Ms Ify Malo donated six packs of Ribena, four carton of biscuits and 20 story books. Also, her team organised an empowerment lecture for all the women in our community.

- **Mrs. Ibilola Essien** donated 78 snacks and 26 large packed raw rice for the children. Likewise, she taught several lessons in civil education in both primary two and three. Constantly, she launches a campaign for the support of the school on her social media platform. In one of her campaigns, she advocated for musical instruments and water dispensers, and her followers responded swiftly. We got brand new water dispensers and one keyboard. Similarly, she campaigned for volunteers, and we got three professionals who actively volunteered throughout the school term. Likewise, Mrs. Essien's campaign for NFI School support caught the attention of members of Run Club, Abuja. Furthermore, Mrs. Essien facilitated five out of thirty slots for our children in the screening exercise on a UN project and was the catalyst for Aisha meeting the vice president to discuss Food Systems dialogues with school age children and adolescents.



Mrs. Folashade Lawal sponsored our sweater for a child project with a seed fund of N100,000 and facilitated the acquisition of the school's second water dispenser.

Mrs. Obiageli Obianozie donated 24 cupcakes, two cartoons of Ribena and sweets.

Miss Zainab and Talatu donated two cartoons of cracker biscuit and four packs of Ribena.

Ms. Amarachi Onyeabo and Monisola Okeya gave our children a talk on self-identity and self-awareness.

To mark the Run Club, Abuja first year anniversary, the club decided to raise money for charity. They raise N3 million (Three million naira) and built a large sized, fully furnished classroom with 20 chairs and tables, two teachers table and chairs, two white boards, and four brand new desktops. The building was commissioned on the 30th September by their members and representatives from Giving.ng. Furthermore, the club donated five crates of soft drinks, six packs of biscuits, two packs of nestle water to mark the day.



- **Medical**

This year, we had a few minor medical cases among our children, teachers, and parents. In June, we had an outbreak of measles in our nursery one. One child infected three other children. Immediately, all our children were immunized against measles. Much thanks to Dr. Rosemary Nwokorie for her speedy intervention. In March, we purchased a pair of glasses for one of our nursery pupil, Master Umar Usman, after the teacher expressed concerns about his visual impairment. Equally, we provided medical fund for one of our parent who had a minor surgery.

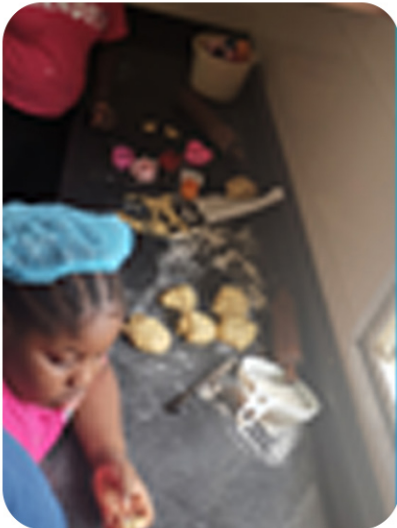


Volunteers

The Teach a child project got a boost this year. We had several volunteers who taught core subjects for a whole school term. We had Mr. Lanre Suleiman, Mr. Douglas Egiemeh, Miss Damilola Lisa, Miss. Iton Egopija, Miss Toluwani Adeniyi, Miss. Wunmi Fajebola, Pastor Mrs. Oluwadahunsi has remained with the school as volunteer, Miss Tobi Oluwadahunsi, Miss Asepe Oluwadahunsi have returned back to school.

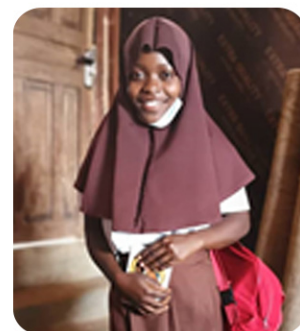
PTA Open day

We had three open days and PTA meeting during the year. Some of the major highlights of the meetings were security of the children, mental health, academic standards, pupil's welfare etc. Parents brought several gifts for teachers. The gifts include a live goat, chickens, maize, soft drinks, spaghetti, ball, two packs of exercise books, stationeries, and cash sum of N3,200 (three thousand two hundred naira).



Scholarship to young adult in the community

The programme is guided by the NFI School philosophy 'every child's education matters'. Young adults in the community who are unable to afford secondary school education are provided with full or partial scholarship. This year, we enrolled two of our extension school young adult in Government Secondary School, Shere, Abuja (boarding school). However, due to the insecurity in and around their school, they were withdrawn after the completion of senior secondary school (SS1). Thankfully, both students got full SS2 scholarship (N790,000) from Mayowa Dickson foundation. Equally, we enrolled one student in JSS 1; one student in JSS 2; and five students in SS1 government secondary schools.



Primary School

We have a total of 71 children in enrolled in nursery one -primary four. We use a Nigerian, British and Montessori blended curriculum in the nursery section and Nigerian curriculum in the primary section. At the beginning of each school year, we provide the children with new sets of uniform and sport wear, two pairs of shoes, two socks, seven textbooks and exercise books, weekly stationeries and daily meals.

Extension School Scholarship Mentorship Program

12years -19years

For these categories of student, they are enrolled in our full or partial scholarship project. We have 20 young adults enrolled in this program but only nine are on scholarship. We provide counselling, academic, social, welfare, and financial support to all the students.

Amatala and Other 'Unforgotten' Children | By Olusegun Adeniyi *Published on 1st April 2021*

Despite protestation from my friend, Waziri Adio who has been her greatest supporter and encourager right from the beginning, I had warned my wife when this whole idea started three years ago that on no account should it get to the media. I promised financial support and when necessary rally close friends but it should always be our own way of giving back to the society in a quiet way. When Ms Tolu Salami, a master's degree holder and job seeker, joined to assist in managing the 'school', I should have seen a red flag with the opening of a Twitter account. But with a followership of just 75 comprising family and friends, I never thought much of it. Then the photograph of Amatala, a two-year old who was in the habit of loitering around the 'school' premises with book in hand, changed everything!

Within a few hours, the Twitter account had attracted more than a thousand followers with many people asking how they could support the initiative. When Waziri told me he was going to blow my cover about the project as a follow up to the tweet, I really couldn't care anymore. But I have so many people to thank for the way my wife is gradually transforming the lives of 54 children, 17 young adults and their parents through an informal project she was compelled to register and now goes by the name Not Forgotten Initiative (NFI).

It's a long story but let me share the key points. There were many ramshackle shanties around our house in Asokoro with inhabitants whose children were just roaming the area. On a particular day in 2018, a pregnant woman flagged down my wife as she drove past, asking for help. Her husband had asked her to move her things from their abode and she needed someone to intervene. Upon investigation, the conflict stemmed from her refusal to give him the N5,000 she had saved from her petty trading to send Haruna, her first son whose father is late, to school. She was looking to get the savings to N15,000 to register the boy in school and here she was, about to be kicked out of her matrimonial home. When my wife discussed the matter with me, she followed up with a proposition: Why don't we take up Haruna's education? I agreed instantly. Then she added, 'What about the other kids? We need to do something about them as well.' She told me she had discussed with parents and they expressed willingness to have their children (14 at the time) in school but had no money. I told her to go ahead with whatever she planned, promising to provide the financial resources. I know I have good friends I can always count on.

My wife took my word as a license to construct two classrooms in a make-shift structure on an empty land within the area. But the moment the 14 pupils were enrolled and one teacher employed, we had many children showing up, looking all scruffy and tattered. And we could not turn them back. We hired two more teachers. Just as I was getting worried by the financial implications as the number of pupils kept increasing, my friend, Folorunsho (Foli) Coker, added a new idea. Following his appointment as Director General of Nigerian Tourism Development Corporation (NTDC), Coker arrived Abuja in 2017 to take accommodation beside the 'school'. He fell in love with the children and inquired about people behind the idea. When he got to know I was involved, Foli called me to suggest, "Segun, your wife has to go beyond teaching those children. They deserve at least one meal a day. I will support you." That was how meal became part of the project.

We soon introduced the 'extension school' with the sole purpose of providing after school support to struggling students from government owned secondary schools, particularly in Mathematics, English and basic science. We also serve them lunch and the number grew from the initial eight to 17. One of them emerged the president of his school's mathematics club, another became the best overall student in mathematics. It was like a dream come true when we offered a full boarding scholarship to two of them who recently completed their junior WAEC and others are working so hard to benefit from this opportunity. We have since extended the 'school' from two to seven classrooms, five teachers, several volunteers. And from the beginning, we promised that we would give those kids the best education so they undertake excursion visits, have movie days and many professionals come in from time to time to fire their imaginations. But the most fulfilling for me is that our three children love the idea and treat those NFI children, all of whose names they know (I know only a few) like siblings.

For proper documentation, my wife was advised to register the 'school'. It was at the point of registration that she was told that if we were providing uniforms, bags, shoes, socks, stationary, one meal a day and everything, we couldn't register it as a school. They said it had to be registered as an NGO. That was how the Not Forgotten Initiative (NFI) came to be. There are currently 54 registered pupils but there are 83 more on the 'Waiting List' (those that could not be accommodated) and 17 'extension school' students.

During the pandemic, it was impossible to transition to digital learning, so my wife and children dropped off homework and relief materials to their houses for the children and families. A young lady named Mariam joined our evening tutorial programme for secondary school students. Then the story emerged that her mother was planning to give her away in marriage. After investigation, we realised that the mother wanted to take advantage of an offer of 150,000 Naira from a suitor to marry her off. My wife spoke to the mother, auntie and the brother in law, and they agreed to cancel the marriage if NFI would cater for Mariam's education. We gladly accepted the deal. Another young lady, Nana Usman was brought to us to be a cleaner because the family could no longer cater for her education. We also accepted responsibility for her education. She has just completed her junior WAEC as well.

But not all stories are pleasant. Very recently, two NFI pupils, ages 8 and 5, witnessed the rape of their two-year-old sibling in their home. We sought help from the good people of Cece-yara foundation and all three kids are getting therapy and the culprit is currently in police custody, because he was actually caught in the act. The story of Amatala has resonated but there is still trouble in her home. Her father, who had abandoned their mother since last year, walked into NFI two weeks ago and asked to withdraw his four children and take them to the village. We thought by putting Haruna (whose father is late) in boarding school, the man would relent but he is fighting back through the children enrolled in NFI, including Amatala! Incidentally, part of the programme includes persuading difficult parents like him and building a support system that can pressurise them into pursuing the best interests of their children.

The NFI experience has been an exciting journey and hopefully, one day I will tell the complete story. The aim is to help these children and young adults to become the best they can possibly be and break the cycle of poverty in their families. My wife is a chartered insurer (ACIIN) and a chartered accountant (with both ICAN and ACCA). But she stopped her business to devote all her attention to running the 'school'. We started with a 6/6 feet structure in December 2018. Then expanded the structure to 12/12 feet in March 2019. And built another in January this year. All these structures are on a land whose owner we still don't know and from whom we never secured any permission in the first place. I suspect that the owner is aware of what we are doing and is probably watching.

It is interesting that we have become like foster parents to these children whose parents are also to us almost like families. To all of them, I am daddy and my wife, mummy. But we could not have come this far without the support of very good people to whom we are indebted. We appreciate them all.

I am of the firm conviction that the issue of millions of out-of-school children is something that should concern not only the government but the larger society. Together, we can collectively tackle this menace.

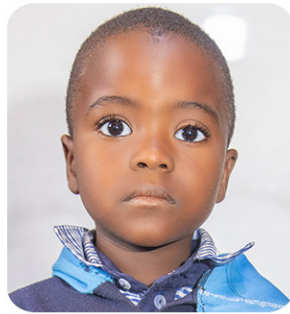
